SUNDAY GOSPEL REFLECTION

This Sunday, the Gospel is proclaimed by someone besides a priest or deacon. Every individual in our church takes part. It's a great privilege and it literally gives us a role in Christ's passion. However, what do we say? What lines are we given?

*"He deserves to die!" - "Barabbas!" - "Let him be crucified!"
"Crucify him!" - "Take him away, crucify him!"*

We are the mob, and we cruelly assist in condemning Christ to death. The great irony, of course, is that we do it while clutching the palms. They are a reminder and an indictment. While we were standing here, crying out "*Crucify him!*", we were clutching the branches that we use to sing out "*Hosanna*". The palms reveal our very human duplicity of how easily we turn. How quickly we pivot from faithful to faithless, from belief to doubt, from being disciples to being betrayers. We start out acting like angels, singing "*Hosanna*", and we end up just being the mob.

In our own brokenness and sinfulness, we ask that he remember us. We pray that we may be better than we are, and receive better than we deserve. We pray that we, who often deserve to be forgotten, may be remembered.

So, this is the day we remember. We remember Christ's journey to the cross, which began with his journey into Jerusalem. We remember our role in his passion – our own sinfulness.



As we journey forward this Holy Week, let us look at the palms and *what we are called to do, and who we are called to be.*

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PASTOR'S MESSAGE**Celebrating the Easter Holy Triduum**

We begin Holy Week with *Palm Sunday* that leads into the heart of the liturgical year: the Easter Holy Triduum. This event should be seen as *ONE* continuous commemoration of the *Paschal Mystery of Christ*. We invite you to this special time of prayer and preparation for what we are about to celebrate in beautiful liturgies of each day. Our parish church seating capacity is limited during these celebrations. Come early. Invite your friends, especially Christians who do not come to Sunday Mass regularly and those of no church at all.

Holy Thursday of the Lord's Supper (April 13): We commemorate Jesus' command to celebrate the Eucharist and wash one another's feet as a symbol of service.

- ❖ Solemn Mass Celebration of the Lord's Supper at 7:00pm

- ❖ Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament in silence until 12:00 midnight.

Friday of the Passion of the Lord (April 14): We solemnly commemorate the Passion and Death of Our Lord Jesus, venerate the Cross of our Salvation and receive Holy Communion. We enter the church silently and leave silently at the end. Please observe silence in the church this day. We observe a fast & abstinence in honor of the Passion and Death of Our Lord.

Holy Saturday (April 15): We keep a Solemn Vigil; we celebrate the Resurrection of Our Lord by **lighting** a New Paschal Candle and solemn procession led by the **Light of Christ, recalling the Story** of our Salvation in the Liturgy of the Word, solemnly **initiating new members** into our community through Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist.

READINGS FOR NEXT SUNDAY, APRIL 16, 2017

First Reading: Acts 10:34, 37-43

This passage is Peter's address to the household of Cornelius; the Roman centurion in Caesarea focuses on the central theme of Easter. It shows how the apostles fulfilled the command to preach the Gospel. Peter teaches on the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, with the conclusion that salvation comes through faith in Jesus Christ.



Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 118:1-2, 16-17, 22-23

Psalm 118 is a hymn of thanksgiving to God as Savior of his people, and it looks toward the enthronement of the Messiah as Lord forever. The response fits in with the joy of Easter: "This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad."

Second Reading: Colossians 3:1-4

Paul in this passage highlights the new life that is God's gift in the resurrection. Paul's words open to us another dimension of Easter. For Paul, Easter is not only a celebration of Jesus' resurrection, but also a celebration of our being raised with Christ to a new life. Consequently, we have to think of the things that are above.

Gospel: John 20:1-9

Throughout his Gospel, John calls attention to growth in faith through a step by step encounter with Christ. In this account of the resurrection, Mary of Magdala plays an important role in reporting to Peter and the disciple Jesus loved that Jesus' body has been taken away. The two Apostles rush to investigate the mystery of the empty tomb. In seeing the circumstances, they begin to believe. It is important to note that all three are witnesses. We also note that the disciple Jesus loved is the first to penetrate the mystery of the empty tomb. "He saw and believed." The appearances of the Risen Lord would therefore play a crucial role in deepening the faith of the Apostles. They in turn may give witness to Jesus from their own personal experience (cf. Lk 24:13-35, the Gospel for Easter Evening Mass on the Emmaus story).

REMEMBER TO FAST ON GOOD FRIDAY!

***FASTING:** In the United States dioceses, Catholics aged 18 through 59 are bound to fast on Good Friday (April 14). To **fast** means to consume one full meal a day at most, although taking of other smaller quantities of food at the other customary mealtimes is permitted.

Food and drink between meal (*excepting water and medicine*) is not permitted on fast days.

***ABSTINENCE FROM MEAT:** Catholics (aged 14 and up) are to abstain from meat on *Ash Wednesday, all Fridays of Lent, and Good Friday*. To **abstain** means *refraining from eating beef, veal, pork, or poultry at least*, although eggs and milk products are acceptable. Consumption of *fish and shellfish* is permitted, through the penitential character of the abstinence should be kept in mind.

LITURGY INSIGHT

***Why were the statues in the Church covered on the 5th Sunday of Lent?
Aren't they supposed to be covered on Palm Sunday?***



There are so many traditions in our Catholic Faith. The Directive of the Bishop from our **ORDO** (Liturgical Calendar Planner provided to each parish within its own diocese) states: "*The covering of statues may be practiced on the 5th Sunday of Lent.*" By covering the statues, this tradition helps us to focus on Christ through the Altar (*Eucharist*) and the Ambo (*Word of God*).

But WHY the 5th Sunday of Lent?

The 5th Sunday of Lent is also known as *Passion Sunday* or the beginning of *Passiontide*. This is two weeks before Easter, and marks specific events leading up to Christ's crucifixion and resurrection. In the *Daily Readings* during *Passiontide*, some of the Jews plot to kill Jesus, and the readings build tension as Jesus gets closer and closer to Jerusalem.

On *Palm Sunday*, we hear the Passion Gospel Reflection from Matthew, Cycle A. It might have seemed appropriate to have the statues covered then. However, the Pastor's decision (*Pastoral Discretion*) let us keep an open mind and an open heart to different interpretations of the Liturgy. It may or may not be the same next year.

May the Holy Spirit move us to encounter Christ in any way, shape or form.

From Palms to Passion

Mt 21:1-11 and Mt 26:14-27:66

Palm Sunday is the sixth and final Sunday of Lent. It is sometimes called “Passion Sunday” because it marks the beginning of Holy Week. There are two Gospel readings for Palm Sunday. The first, during the blessing of the palms, tells the story of Jesus entering Jerusalem in triumph. The second reading tells the story of the Passion and death of the Lord.

Holy Week is the most sacred time of year for Catholics. It’s okay if your Holy Week list of things to do includes coloring eggs, cleaning and baking for Easter, or traveling to a relative’s home. There’s nothing wrong with secular Easter activities. But it is important to balance the

secular with the sacred by keeping the “holy” in Holy Week.

If you work or go to school, try to set aside time every day this week for quiet prayer, Scripture reading, and meditation. Offer up any pain or difficulties you experience and unite your sufferings with the pain of Christ. Make it a point on Good

Friday to let go of resentments and forgive those who have hurt you.

Your greatest temptation during Holy Week will be scrimping on your spiritual needs because there is so much going on. If you let that happen, your Easter celebration may look perfect on the surface, but it will feel spiritually empty.

Make Holy Week special for the whole family by turning off television, computers, and electronic games from sundown on Holy Thursday until Easter morning. Pray the Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary together as a family. Plan to attend all of the Triduum liturgies. Volunteer as a family to help decorate your parish church on Holy Saturday for the Easter Vigil.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Leftover palms are burned and the ashes are used next year on Ash Wednesday.
- The Chrism Mass is where holy oils are blessed.
- The word “Triduum” means “three days.” It starts at sundown on Holy Thursday and includes Good Friday and Holy Saturday.

Entering into the Passion of Christ

Here are some things to meditate on this week as you journey with Jesus to Calvary:

The condemnation of Jesus: Have you ever been judged unfairly? Have you ever judged others?

Jesus’ acceptance of the cross: What are the crosses in your life?

Jesus falls three times: In what ways have you fallen? How have you picked yourself up?

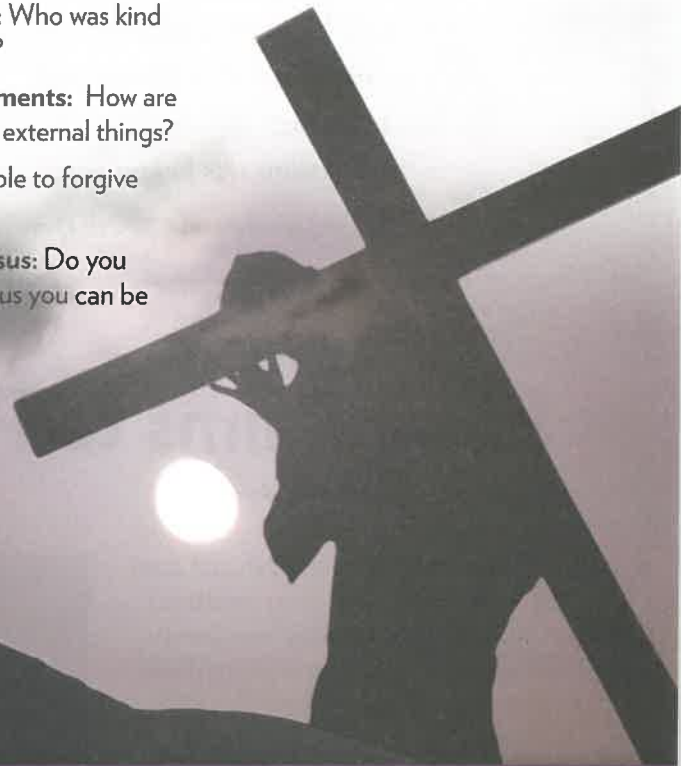
Simon of Cyrene helps Jesus: How have you helped others carry their crosses?

Veronica wipes Jesus’ face: Who was kind to you during difficult times?

Jesus is stripped of his garments: How are you being called to let go of external things?

The Crucifixion: Are you able to forgive those who have hurt you?

The death and burial of Jesus: Do you believe that by following Jesus you can be transformed?

Lenten Prayer

This week’s prayer is known as the “Three O’Clock Prayer” (part of the Divine Mercy Chaplet when it is said at 3:00 p.m.) in remembrance of the graces we received at the moment Jesus died:

“You expired, O Jesus, but the source of life gushed forth for souls and an ocean of mercy opened up for the whole world. O Fount of Life, unfathomable Divine Mercy, envelop the whole world and empty yourself out upon us. O Blood and Water, which gushed forth from the Heart of Jesus as a fount of mercy for us, I trust in you. Amen.”
