SUNDAY GOSPEL REFLECTION

We see Jesus love and compassion and healing power on full display in today's Gospel Reading from Mark. A leper comes to him and begs to be healed. Jesus, moved with pity, stretches out his hand and heals the man. And then he tells him something somewhat puzzling, "See that you tell no one anything . . ."

Of course, the man does exactly what many of us would do --- he immediately tells everyone. After all, this is a "miracle", an unmistakable action of God in their midst. And the former leper wants to make sure everyone knows about it.

Jesus knew that if word got out that he could heal leprosy (or any other disease) he would be inundated with people coming to him from everywhere.

Is that the only reason Jesus told the man to keep quiet? My guess is that Jesus didn't want his message, his promises to be reduced to simply what he could do for people from the "outside", the "flashy" sorts of miracles that get all the attention. He wanted to make sure that people realized that the real "miracles" he wanted to "perform" were on the "inside", miracles of the heart, soul, and spirit.

The miracles within each of us are really what Jesus died to make possible. The power of the resurrection allows the hardened heart to soften, the cruel heart to become kind and compassionate, the selfish heart to become generous, the vindictive heart to become forgiving, and the sinful heart to be washed clean --- enabling us to once again start down a different path, a journey into the arms of our loving God for all eternity.

I don't know about you, but if all of that happened within me --- that would be a miracle!

So let's let God do precisely that --- not just today, but every moment of our lives. And it's ok --- God gives us **permission to tell everyone**

READINGS FOR NEXT SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 18, 2018

First Sunday of Lent

First Reading: Genesis 9:8-15

Christian tradition has always seen the flood as an image of the "waters of baptism that make an end of sin and a new beginning of goodness" (Rite of Baptism, Blessing of the Water). Both aspects of destruction and new life are conveyed in the flood story. As sin is destroyed, new life comes forth, born out of the same water. The flood is not simply a chance but the result of humanity's sinfulness. In the midst of this catastrophe, the saving will of God is at work, and the basic goodness of creation and of humankind is reaffirmed in the covenant God made with Noah.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 25:4-5, 6-7, 8-9

Psalm 25 is a prayer reaffirming God's ways of love and truth that find their fulfillment in forgiveness and mercy for those who keep his covenant. Response: "Your ways, O Lord, are love and truth, to those who keep your covenant."

Second Reading: 1 Peter 3:18-22

This text from 1 Peter is considered to be an early baptismal instruction in which the Christian life is described for new converts as to its meaning and obligations. This passage quotes a simple formula of faith in Christ: "Jesus died to flesh and rose to the spirit; he descended to the realm of the dead, and went to heaven at God's right hand in power." The author compares the baptism that new Christians now experience with the flood of Noah's time. The descent into hell (the realm of the dead) seems to signify Christ's lordship over all creation without exception — even the underworld. This allows the good news of salvation to be proclaimed to those who had gone before.

Gospel: Mark 1:12-15

Mark's Gospel was the first to be written and therefore reflects the earliest preaching of the apostles. Mark was concerned only with the ministry of Jesus. His Gospel begins by considering Jesus as the Messiah at his baptism in the Jordan. In this short passage, the Gospel goes directly to the temptation in the desert, covered very briefly. We do not find the threefold temptation in Mark's Gospel, nor the statement about Jesus fasting. The point Mark wants to underline is that Jesus emerges victorious and strengthened from the struggle with his temptations in the harshness of the desert. After that Jesus proclaims the coming of the kingdom; the new and full relationship between God and humankind and its requirements are a change of heart and faith. "Repent and believe in the gospel."

- *To *fast* means to consume one full meal a day at most, although taking of other, smaller quantities of food at the other customary mealtimes permitted. Food and drink between meals (except water and medicine) is not permitted on fast days.
- *Abstinence from Meat- Catholics aged 14 and up are to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, all Fridays of Lent, and Good Friday.
- *To *abstain* means refraining from eating beef, veal, pork, or poultry at least, although eggs and milk products are acceptable. The consumption of fish and shellfish is permitted, though the penitential character of the abstinence should be kept in mind.

Love is in the air! February is the month for Valentine's Day. What better way to get your heart healthy?

Here are *some* heart-healthy tips:

- Replace processed meats such as sausages, bacon, Spam, and hot dogs with turkey-containing products such as turkey sausages, turkey bacon, Turkey Spam, and turkey hot dogs.
- Consume two 4-ounce portions of omega-3 fish per week such as Salmon, Sardines, Mackerel, Herring, Anchovies, oysters, Rainbow Trout, Albacore Tuna, Mussels, Pacific Halibut, and Catfish (source: U.S. News Health)
- Watch your sodium intake by choosing more whole, less-processed foods
- Include Olive oil in your cooking to sautés or to make salad dressings.
- Enjoy one ounce of dark chocolate with at least 65% Cacao per day.
- * Add walnuts to cereal, salads or muffins.
- Choose the tips that you can include in your lifestyle consistently and enjoy!
