SUNDAY GOSPEL REFLECTION

For Jesus there is no small gift that cannot be transformed to benefit a multitude. Thus there is a great lesson we learn from the Gospel story of the little boy who gives away his lunch. That gift was so insignificant to God the creator of the universe, yet the Son of God takes it and multiplies to feed five thousand. One lesson that Jesus wants to teach us this Sunday is that material needs are relevant to the work of evangelization. Jesus' own example of sensitivity to the immediate situation of human need is an important pastoral approach. He takes human need seriously. What does the story of the multiplication of loaves and fish mean in the context of our parish where we are currently focusing on ecclesial lay ministries? The story of the boy giving away his lunch may be compared to our smallest gifts, talents and treasure.

We all have many small but beautiful gifts we can offer. Who in our parish cannot afford to offer a few minutes of prayer to God each day? Some possess talents for services like reading during Mass on Sunday, some are cantors, others play the piano, we have catechists, extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion, altar servers, lectors and ushers, to name just a few. The time you give for these ministries may look insignificant, but the Lord takes your small gift and multiplies it to nourish us all daily and on Sundays. Your free will donation in the collection basket is another example of your offering to the Lord. When the Lord takes your gift, He multiplies it to nourish our spiritual hunger in many ways. The prophecy of Elisha and the multiplication of loaves by Jesus is fulfilled right in our eyes. We all get enough and some left over! I would like to imagine that probably the little boy was given some of the left over to take home. What a blessing when we give our small gifts!

Good News on Anonymous Donation

Dear Parishioners,

Sunday after Sunday we have said the prayer for our Capital Campaign with deep faith commitment. We sometimes wonder if God is listening to our prayers. Today I have good news for our One Community Center which we need to be thankful.

An anonymous donor has been moved by the efforts we have made so far and pledged \$1 million donation for the construction of the OCC. The donor gives us a challenge with several terms to fulfill:

- 1) That we complete phase II of the capital campaign by raising the remaining \$900k in order to reach the expected parish goal of \$2.5 million by July 31.
- 2) That the parish prepare a budget that supports the financing of at least \$2M construction loan at the close of the project.
- 3) That the parish Religious Education Programs are maintained and expanded to reach out to the families in the community.

Dear parishioners, we are challenged to do our part and I believe we can do it. Thank you so much to all who have made their pledge. If you have not yet made your pledge, we kindly urge you to make the 3-year pledge so we can complete Phase II of the campaign and benefit from the anonymous donation. You have already received pledge cards at home. Please fill them and bring them next Sunday.

Some parishioners who made their pledge in Phase I have increased their pledge. If you are able to increase your pledge you may do so by competing another card or by calling the parish office to adjust your 3-year pledge.

This Sunday is CHALLENGE SUNDAY when pledge cards are provided in envelopes for everyone, in order to give an opportunity to all to take pledge cards and fill them out. This will help the parish reach the \$900,000 by end of July. May God bless our anonymous donor.

READINGS FOR NEXT SUNDAY, AUGUST 5, 2018

Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading: Exodus 16:2-4,12-15

This passage begins by telling us that the whole community of Israel grumbled against Moses and Aaron. The episode of murmuring in the wilderness highlights the fact that their real need for food put their faith in God to the test. They doubted God's care, even after all the spectacular liberation from Egypt. The seriousness of their complain was what they wanted in their murmuring. They preferred their former slavery of Egypt with food, rather than their freedom without food. They naively wished they were back in Egypt. Yet God heard their grumbling and responded with a promise of bread from heaven (manna).

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 78:3-4,23-24,25,54

Psalm 78 refers to Exodus episode of the Lord providing the people of Israel in the wilderness with food. "He rained manna upon them and gave them heavenly bread." Thus the response to the psalm: "The Lord gave them (bread) from heaven."

Second Reading: Ephesians 4:17,20-24

In this passage, Paul admonishes the Ephesians not to live as the Gentiles, but rather put away the old way of life by putting on the new self of righteousness and holiness of truth. In other words, the new life of the Christians demands a radical change. Paul uses clothing as a metaphor for the new identity brought about by embracing Christ in Baptism.

Gospel: John 6:24-35

In the aftermath of the stunning miracle of the multiplication of 5 loaves and 2 fish, a long discourse between Jesus and the people follows. Obviously Jesus and the people are on two wave lengths. The people are looking for more bread and more wonders, while Jesus tries to draw them to seek something deeper which He calls "bread from heaven", "living bread", "the bread of eternal life." The people think that Jesus is talking about an endless supply of bread like the manna given in the wilderness in the first reading from Exodus. To their astonishment, Jesus tells them that He Himself is the "living bread," "the true bread from heaven." This teaching clearly points to the Eucharist in which Jesus gives Himself as the living bread of eternal life.
