STEWARDSHIP BULLETIN REFLECTION (JOHN 14:23 -29)

The concept of hospitality is fundamental to a stewardship way of life. When we envision hospitality, we naturally think of offering a sincere and warm welcome — to those new to our parish, for instance. We picture inviting them in and making them feel at home and at ease in our presence, communicating to them that they are highly valued.

Today's Gospel reading from John invites us to think of hospitality in a slightly different way. In it, we hear Jesus speaking this to his disciples: "Whoever loves me will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our dwelling with him."

Jesus is asking that we permit the Blessed Trinity to come and dwell within us. This is a stunning request. It tells us that our first and most privileged form of hospitality should be directed towards God Himself.

How does one show hospitality to God? How do we make God "at home and at ease" within us? How can we communicate to God that He is "highly valued" by us? Jesus tells us how: we are to keep His word, to follow His teachings.

To keep His word, we must know His word. This takes discipline and effort on our part. We must make the study of Scripture and Church teaching a priority in our daily lives.

If we want our parish to be a place of genuine Christian hospitality, we must be sure that our own hearts are hospitable dwelling places for the Blessed Trinity. Then our smiles and words, our greetings and ministries will radiate with the warmth of God's love. And our parish family will become at least a little bit like Heaven on earth. This is the simplicity and glory of a stewardship way of life.

FR. ANTHONY'S STEWARDSHIP CORNER (CONSUMERISM AND GLOBAL INEQUALITY)

Instead of resolving the problems of the poor and thinking of how the world can be different, some can only propose a reduction in the birth rate. At times, developing countries face forms of international pressure that make economic assistance contingent on certain policies of "reproductive health."

To blame population growth instead of extreme and selective consumerism on the part of some is one way of refusing to face the issues. It is an attempt to legitimize the present model of distribution, where a minority believes that it has the right to consume in a way that can never be universalized since the planet could not even contain the waste products of such consumption. Besides, we know that approximately a third of all food produced is discarded, and "whenever food is thrown out, it is as if it were stolen from the table of the poor."

Inequity affects not only individuals but entire countries; it compels us to consider the ethics of international relations. A true "ecological debt" exists, particularly between the global north and south, connected to commercial imbalances with effects on the environment, and the disproportionate use of natural resources by certain countries over long periods of time.

The warming caused by huge consumption on the part of some rich countries has repercussions on the poorest areas of the world, especially Africa, where a rise in temperature, together with drought, has proved devastating for farming. There is also the damage caused by the export of solid waste and toxic liquids to developing countries, and by the pollution produced by companies that operate in less developed countries in ways they could never do at home, in the countries in which they raise their capital: We note that often the businesses which operate this way are multinationals. They do here what they would never do in developed countries or the so-called first world. Generally, after ceasing their activity and withdrawing, they leave behind great human and environmental liabilities such as unemployment, abandoned towns, the depletion of natural reserves, and deforestation.

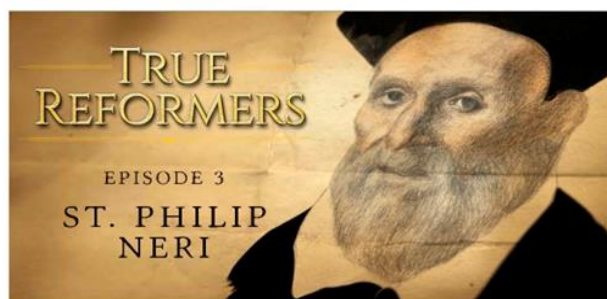

TRUE REFORMERS: EPISODE 3 ST. PHILIP NERI

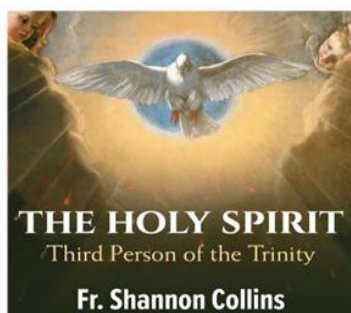

In his encyclical *Centesimus Annus*, Pope St. John Paul II wrote, "God has imprinted his own image and likeness on man, conferring upon him an incomparable dignity" (no. 11). It is with this view of human dignity that *Centesimus Annus Pro Pontifice*, a lay-led organization founded by John Paul II and based at the Vatican, works to promote Catholic social teaching (CST). CAPP-USA, the U.S. arm of *Centesimus Annus Pro Pontifice*, does this through digital communications such as its website and social media channels. These digital resources include informative video presentations with engaging graphics to illustrate the principles of human dignity, solidarity, and subsidiarity that work at the heart of the Church's teachings.

With support from the CCC, CAPP-USA produced ten videos and six infographics explaining core concepts of CST and how they apply to current social issues. CAPP-USA engaged thousands of Americans on social media and continued to build its website as a platform for instructing and engaging visitors through a first-of-its-kind CST content library. 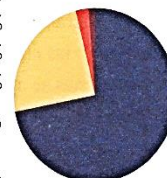

Su apoyo a la Campaña Católica de la Comunicación (CCC) ayuda a dar vida a la riqueza de las enseñanzas sociales de la Iglesia a través de unos interesantes medios de comunicación.

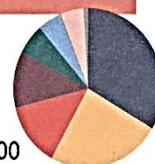
En su encíclica *Centesimus Annus*, el papa san Juan Pablo II escribió que Dios “En [el hombre] ha impreso su imagen y semejanza, confiriéndole una dignidad incomparable” (no. 11). Es con esta visión de la dignidad humana que Centesimus Annus Pro Pontifice, organización dirigida por laicos, fundada por Juan Pablo II y con sede en el Vaticano, trabaja para promover la enseñanza social católica (CST, en inglés). CAPP-USA, la rama estadounidense de Centesimus Annus Pro Pontifice, realiza esto a través de comunicaciones digitales como su sitio web y sus canales de comunicación social. Estos recursos digitales incluyen presentaciones en video con unos interesantes gráficos para ilustrar los principios de la dignidad humana, la solidaridad y la subsidiaridad que obran en el corazón de las enseñanzas de la Iglesia.

Con fondos de la CCC, CAPP-USA ha producido diez videos y seis infográficos que explican los conceptos fundamentales de las enseñanzas sociales católicas y la manera en que éstas se aplican a los asuntos sociales de actualidad. CAPP-USA hizo partícipe a miles de estadounidenses a través de las redes sociales y continuó construyendo su sitio web como una plataforma para instruir y atraer a sus visitantes a través de una biblioteca que contiene las enseñanzas sociales católicas y que es la primera de su tipo. Sus contribuciones a la Campaña Católica de la Comunicación hacen posibles iniciativas que captan el interés del público mediante un interesante y atractivo contenido que dan vida a la riqueza de las enseñanzas católicas.
