SUNDAY GOSPEL REFLECTION BY CATHOLIC STEWARDSHIP CONSULTANTS

Today, we celebrate the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, when Mary and Joseph brought their infant Son to the Temple in obedience to the laws of their Jewish faith. This is a beautiful, and in many ways, mysterious feast — and one that is filled with lessons for a stewardship way of life.



Our Gospel passage from Luke, recounting the details of the Presentation, teaches us a stewardship lesson through the example of St. Joseph and the Blessed Mother, the “Holy Parents.” Even knowing their Son was God, they still carefully observed the faith practices of their day bringing him to the temple “to present Him to the Lord just as it is written in the law of the Lord.” Later in the passage we read that, “When they had fulfilled all the prescriptions of the law of the Lord, they returned to their own town of Nazareth.” The Holy Parents were good stewards of their child, teaching Him to live in obedience to the practices of their faith from his infancy and throughout His “growing up” years.

Those of us entrusted with the care of children, whether our own children, godchildren, nieces, and nephews, grandchildren, or students, have a vital role to play in the faith formation of these young ones. We, like the Holy Parents, must steward these children well, forming them in the faith by both instruction and example throughout their lives.

What a privilege and high calling we have as Christian stewards. Let us take these stewardship lessons to heart and present our gifts and our young ones joyfully to the Lord.

Pope St. John Paul II's Challenge to Our Church: The Inspiration for *Walking with Moms in Need*



On March 25, 2020, the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord, the Church celebrated the 25th anniversary of the papal encyclical *Evangelium vitae* (*The Gospel of Life*). This prophetic document, written by a great saint of our time, Pope John Paul II, reaffirmed the Church's constant teaching on the value and inviolability of every human life.

In this encyclical, the Holy Father explains that the Gospel of Life is at the *heart* of Jesus' saving message to the world. Through the Incarnation of Christ, God reveals to us the dignity of all human life. Each of us is made in the image and likeness of God, reflecting his glory and his imprint. We are therefore called to "respect, defend and promote the dignity of every human person, at every moment and in every condition of that person's life."¹

Evangelium vitae highlights the special and particular role of women in bearing the gift of life to the world. Pope John Paul II offers heartfelt thanks to these "heroic mothers," who, placing their trust in God, "devote themselves to their own family without reserve, who suffer in giving birth to their children and who are ready to make any effort, to face any sacrifice, in order to pass on to them the best of themselves."²



Pope John Paul II also outlines the many challenges that expectant mothers may face, including lack of support from the father, financial strains, concerns about her own health or that of her child, and pressures from family and friends. The Holy Father recognizes that an "unborn child is totally entrusted to the protection and care of the woman carrying him or her in the womb."³ For this reason, it is particularly important that the Church come alongside mothers, offering them encouragement, assistance, and support.

Through Christ, we have received the gift of the Gospel of Life in its fullness. As members of the Church, we are the *people of life and for life*. It is our duty to proclaim the truth of the Gospel of Life to the world, for "*to proclaim Jesus is itself to proclaim life*."⁴ Pope John Paul II tasked us with building a culture of life to combat the forces at work in the culture of death. He challenged us:

*With great openness and courage, we need to question how widespread is the culture of life today among individual Christians, families, groups and communities in our Dioceses. With equal clarity and determination we must identify the steps we are called to take in order to serve life in all its truth.*⁵

In honor of *Evangelium vitae*'s 25th anniversary and in answer to Pope John Paul II's call, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops Committee on Pro-Life Activities launched a nationwide effort entitled, ***Walking with Moms in Need***. Parishes, through the support of their bishops and pastors, are invited to join this effort to increase the Church's outreach and support to pregnant women facing difficult or unexpected pregnancies. This special anniversary has provided the Church with an opportunity to assess, expand, and better communicate resources to pregnant moms and families in need.

Pregnant and parenting moms in need are in our parishes and our neighborhoods, but in desperation, they are turning to other places for help. We know the needs and challenges can be immense for women in difficult pregnancies, especially

women in poverty, and the sources for help may not be apparent to those most needing support. Women facing challenging pregnancies should see the Church as a place where they can find help, especially with its extensive social services dedicated to meeting the needs of people in crisis.

Through *Walking with Moms in Need* the Church is being asked to respond to Pope John Paul II's call and honestly assess the pastoral and practical assistance that it currently provides to pregnant moms and families in need and how effective it is in communicating such help.

Pope John Paul II wrote that, "gratitude and joy at the incomparable dignity of the human person impel us to share [the Gospel of Life] with everyone."⁶ He said we need to bring this message "to the hearts of all people and make it penetrate every part of society."⁷ By reaching out to lovingly support and care for pregnant women and their children, we witness to the sanctity of every human person, in every stage and every circumstance.

Evangelium vitae emphasizes that, "where life is involved, the service of charity must be profoundly consistent. It cannot tolerate bias and discrimination, for human life is sacred and inviolable... We need then to 'show care' for all life and for the life of everyone."⁸ Pope John Paul II highlights the incredible history of service and charity that the Church has provided throughout the centuries to those abandoned and forgotten by society. He urges that "every Christian community, with a renewed sense of responsibility, must



continue to write this history."⁹

We are called to reverence and love every human person as ourselves. It is our responsibility to care for and protect human life, especially the lives of the most vulnerable among us. *Evangelium vitae* teaches us that "the task of accepting and serving life involves everyone; and this task must be fulfilled above all towards life when it is at its weakest."¹⁰

Pope John Paul II wrote, "the Gospel of God's love for man, the Gospel of the dignity of the person and the Gospel of life are a single and indivisible Gospel."¹¹ The Gospel of Jesus *is* the Gospel of Life, and to love Jesus is to love and serve life. As followers of Christ, may we strive to continually respond to the needs of the poor and vulnerable entrusted to us by God.

As part of Walking with Moms in Need, the USCCB Secretariat of Pro-Life Activities is providing educational, pastoral, and action-oriented resources to help parishes go to the peripheries and bring hope and help to mothers in need. Through the combined efforts of parishes nationwide, we hope to move closer to the day when every pregnant mother in need knows where to turn for help, and abortion is unthinkable. 'The Eucharist is my strength': the story of Sr Alicia Torres

It all began when Alicia Torres was attending Loyola University as an undergrad. Theology and bio-ethics were on this "Navy Brat's" plate. On the side, she began spending time in Eucharistic adoration. That precious time led her to the point of forming "an actual relationship with Him." "Not only did the Eucharist become more real," but her "intellectual faith" was transformed into a "faith in my heart that, yeah, this is Jesus!"

It did not end there. As the Mass and her own life became more real, Alicia began to sense "an invitation to belong totally to the Lord as a religious sister."

She joined a newly-founded group of religious, the Franciscans of the Eucharist of Chicago. Alicia is still "baffled" how the Lord led her to this community since she had not been involved with service to the poor. She thought her mission would unfold in the pro-life movement she was active in since high school. However, looking back on her thirteen years in the congregation, Sr Alicia confidently says, "the Lord's plan is perfect."

There is, however, a connection between St Francis of Assisi and the Eucharist, Sr Alicia explains. "So many people don't realize how Eucharistic St Francis of Assisi was – he wrote a letter to every priest in the entire

world after Lateran IV emphasizing putting into practice what the Council called for around respect and reverence of the Eucharist."

Eucharist for people suffering and in need

For Sr Alicia and her fellow sisters, their mission to the poor through evangelization and teaching flows from their "relationship with Jesus Christ in the Eucharist."

"There's a tremendous relationship between our Lord's, true presence in the Eucharist and His presence to His people, especially those who are suffering and in need." Not only did the Lord steer her in a direction she had not seen coming, He led her to a congregation in which she was "one of the first sisters to join." It was "in its pioneer days," Sr Alicia says. But there is more to Sr Alicia than what meets the eye. Her list of hobbies includes some things you might expect of a woman religious – "writing, reading and lesson planning." But there are others that express her own personality – stargazing, coffee, falcons and the Middle Ages.

Sr Alicia now lives and serves as a religion teacher in a poor, inner-city neighborhood in Chicago. "The Eucharist is at the heart of the classroom, the heart of the experience of the children," she explains.

She has personally witnessed how inviting very young children into an encounter with the Lord leads to belief in Jesus's presence in the Eucharist. "I have a child who's very non-verbal and I asked him to draw a picture of Jesus" two months after their lesson on the Eucharist. "He drew a circle with a cross in the middle. I asked, 'What did you draw?' He just kept repeating 'God, God,' and pointing to the host that he had drawn."

US Eucharistic Revival

Sr Alicia's mission is now going national through an initiative of the United States Bishops' Conference. She helped organize a retreat attended by the priests who are National Eucharistic Preachers that took place in April 2022 on Chicago's westside. These priests are the bishops' "top preachers" regarding the National Eucharistic Revival.

These religious and diocesan priests are "on the front lines of the Eucharistic Revival," Sr Alicia says. She began serving on the executive committee of the Revival among many other "wonderful primarily lay Catholic leaders," she explains. After being assigned to the specific task of working as a co-coordinator with the priests who would become "National Eucharistic Preachers," she then began helping individual priests discern their call to this mission and provide them with information.

"It's been incredible to see the enthusiasm, and the renewal of their own priestly vocation...since priests have a critical role in bringing the people to the Eucharist and the Eucharist to the people," she says. It's also been "edifying" for her as a woman religious to discover her own "role in the Church" by supporting "something so essential."

"I have a beautiful gift to give, and it's been very life-giving for me."

"I think that the Holy Spirit has great plans, not only for Church in the United States, but for the whole world... We just have to get out of the way and just be the hands and feet and allow the Lord to touch hearts."

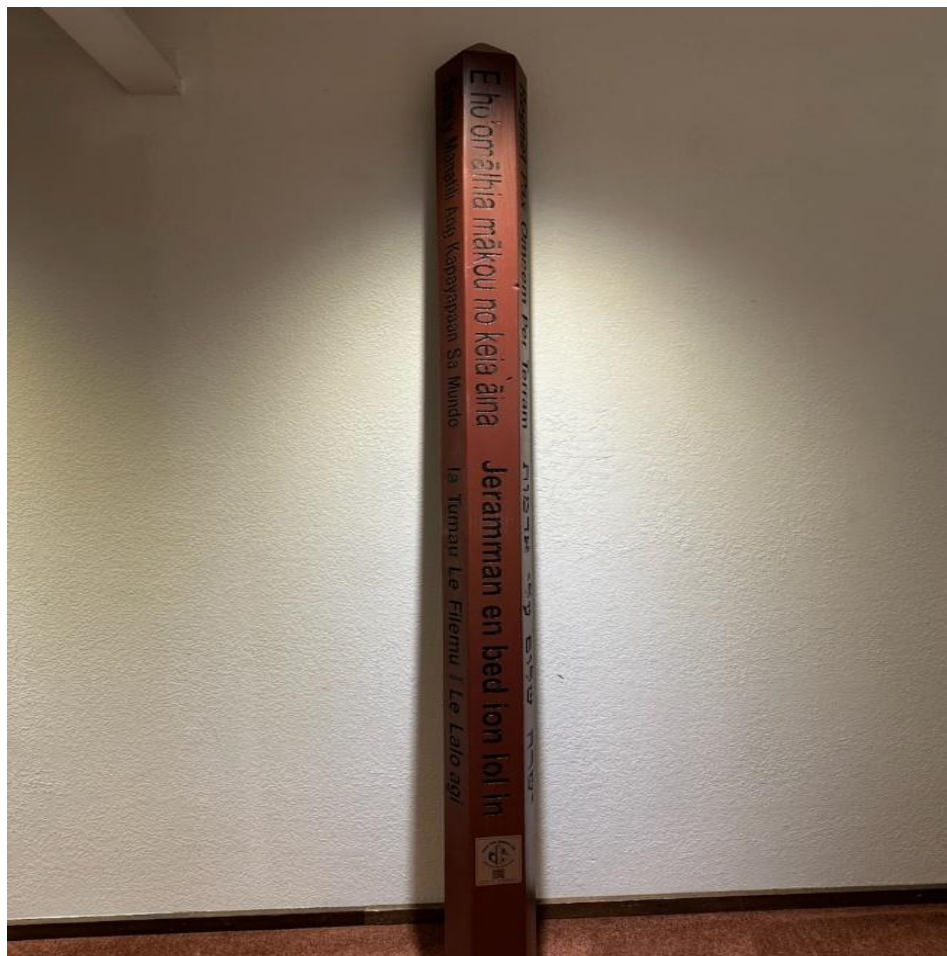
Sr Alicia describes her own vocation as a woman religious as deeply rooted in the Sacrament of Baptism and "critically connected to the Eucharist."

She cannot imagine living any other way, accompanying people in "very difficult circumstances, and still have hope" when "we hear gunshots every day just like the people who live in our neighborhood. But I'm not afraid because I believe that I was asked to be here by the Lord, and that Jesus is intimately united to me, and He's a source of my strength."

A Peace Pole is an internationally recognized symbol for the hopes and dreams of the entire human family, standing vigil in silent prayer for peace on earth. Each Peace Pole bears the message *"May Peace Prevail on Earth"* in different languages on each of its four or six sides.

Peace poles were first thought up by Masahisa Goi, the founder of the Byakko Shinko, a new religious movement in 1955 in Japan, was inspired by the destruction caused by the atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. The phrase, "May peace be upon the earth," comes from a prayer chanted at the Hakko Shinkokai, "May peace prevail on earth / May peace be in our home and nation / May our divine mission be fulfilled / Our Guardian Spirits, Divine Lords, and Master Goi / We are very thankful for your love and guidance". Master Goi believed that thoughts affect reality and the chanting of prayers was the most effective way to achieve world peace. The Japanese Red Army's AIA building hostage crisis in Malaysia in 1975 had caused a worldwide impression of the Japanese to deteriorate. Therefore, he wanted to restore the impression of Japan and the Japanese by demonstrating to the world that they sincerely wanted peace, and he came up with the idea of the Peace Pole.

Last year St. John's Youth Ministry designed and created a Peace Pole for our Parish. Our Peace Pole is six sided and has the message *"May Peace Prevail on Earth"* in twelve different languages. It will be installed this month in front of the Knights of Columbus memorial for the Unborn.
