PASTOR'S CORNER

This week I would like to talk about and present a definition of Love, from the Biblical definition and not the world's definition. But let's start with how our society defines love. Most dictionaries define love as a profound and caring affection toward someone, encompassing a range of feelings, from deep emotional attachment to romantic desire. It can also include elements of compassion, respect, and commitment. Romantic Love: Intense emotional and physical attraction between partners.

In Catholic theology, which is based on Scripture, love is not just an emotion but God's very essence and the foundation of all existence. It is defined as a selfless, sacrificial love, a desire to "will the good of the other," and is exemplified by God's love for humanity through Jesus Christ. This love is unconditional, even in the face of sin, and requires a conscious choice to love God and neighbor.

Here are some key aspects of biblical love:

Love as God's Essence:

The Catholic faith emphasizes that God is love, not just a lover. His being is intrinsically tied to love, and He eternally exchanges love within the Trinity (Father, Son, and Holy Spirit).

Agape Love:

This term, borrowed from Greek, refers to a selfless, sacrificial love that is willing to give and sacrifice for the well-being of others. It's the type of love God has for humanity and is exemplified by Jesus' sacrifice on the cross.

Eros and Philia:

While Eros (romantic/passionate love) and Philia (brotherly love) are also recognized as forms of love, they are understood as expressions of a deeper love, often rooted in the desire for something beautiful or a shared bond with another.

Love as a Choice:

While feelings of love can be experienced, Catholics understand that love ultimately requires a conscious choice to will the good of another. This choice is essential for loving God and neighbor.

Unconditional Love:

God's love is described as unconditional, meaning He loves us even in our shortcomings and sins. However, He cannot love sin itself and desires that we repent and choose to love Him back.

SUNDAY GOSPEL REFLECTION

BY CATHOLIC STEWARDSHIP CONSULTANTS

Today we celebrate the feast of the Most Holy Trinity. What we are commemorating is a central reality of our Christian faith, that God is Trinitarian in nature — three distinct persons in one God.

The Church calls this truth a mystery, as indeed it is. Some have said that "mystery" in this context is "not a wall to run up against but an ocean in which to swim." Contemplating the "ocean depths" of this mystery can make us humans feel so small, and almighty God so far from us. Yet nothing could be further from the truth as today's readings demonstrate.



In the second reading, St. Paul reminds us that God is intimately connected to us. "The love of God has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us." God wants live in the very depths of our being and in all the intimate details of our lives if we will let Him.

And in the Gospel from St. John, we learn that God holds back nothing of Himself from us. Jesus tells His disciples (this includes us!) that the Holy Spirit "will take from what is mine and declare it to you. Everything the Father has is mine." Thus, we find ourselves drawn right into the midst of this Trinitarian love. In fact, if the mystery of Holy Trinity is an ocean which to swim, the "water" that makes up that ocean is love.

What then should be the response of the Christian steward to this sublime mystery? All we can do is worship. And offer our lives back to God in total gratitude for calling us to live in the richness of such unfathomable love.

THE MYSTERY OF THE HOLY TRINITY

The Trinity Revealed: One God, Three Experiences

We begin thinking about the mystery of God as trinity with our experiences of God as Creator, Savior and Sanctifier. Salvation history—the story of God's relationship with creation and humanity—reveals the threefold activity of God as Father, the loving creator who brings into existence and cares for everything that exists; as Jesus, the human crucified liberator sent from God to show us how to live as God's children; and as the Holy Spirit, who is now at work transforming and sanctifying everything in our world.

Many New Testament passages describe how the three persons act and how they relate to each other. But the problem was how these the two new divine revelations of Jesus and the Holy Spirit could be explained and reconciled with the fundamental belief that there was only one God and not three.

The Trinity Explained: One Nature, Three Persons

By the fourth century, several unsuccessful attempts had been made to explain how our Christian God could be one God not three. Finally at the ecumenical Councils of Nicaea (AD 325) and Constantinople (AD 381), to guide believers about how this mystery is to be talked about and understood, a more accurate explanation was formulated that went beyond the biblical descriptive language but formulated its meaning and truth using a more precise terminology.

Using terms based on our human experience of how several different individuals or *persons* all share one and the same human kind of being or *nature*, the Council declared that likewise God was one divine nature that was shared by three individual beings. "Nature" pointed to *what* there was one of in God—divinity—and *person* identified *who* there were three of in God—Father, Son and Holy Spirit who all shared this divinity. As the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* reminds us: "In doing this, the Church did not submit the faith to human wisdom, but gave a new and unprecedented meaning to these terms, which from then on would be used to signify an ineffable mystery, infinitely beyond all that we can humanly understand" (#251).



MADE IN THE IMAGE OF THE TRINITY

Theologians call our Christian belief in one God who exists as a trinity of persons a mystery. The word mystery points to a reality that is beyond our full conceptual explanation, but not beyond our experience. We know God's hidden threefold personal mystery only because God freely reveals it to us through Jesus, God's messiah or Christ, through God's words gathered together in the Bible, through God's loving actions toward us in creation and history, and in God's own divine life of grace within us.

Though God freely revealed this mystery in and through Jesus, God also reveals this mystery in each one of us. Our touchstone to the mystery of the Trinity is first of all the mystery of our own self! We have been created in the image of God (Gen 1:27), which for us Christians means that we have been created in the image of the Trinity and our vocation is to be in a relationship with God as three in one. And like that divine trinitarian reality which is a mystery beyond our explanation but not our experience, our human reality has at its core a deep and unfathomable mystery that we call our self, which despite our most persistent efforts to "know ourself," always contains so much more than we can understand or explain.

This interior self experiences, thinks and knows and wills, but these experiences, thoughts, knowledge and urges to action cannot be known unless we freely choose to reveal them by expressing them exteriorly in our words and actions. Just as we would not know the Father unless there is self-revelation in word (God's word made material in creation, Gen 1:1–2:1, Jn 1:1, and made flesh in Jesus of Nazareth, Jn 1:14), so we would not know ourselves or others without our expression of the self-mystery within us. God also created us by breathing into our material bodies the "breath/Spirit of life" (Gen 2:7). So each of us is an image of the trinity, an original mysterious self that expresses itself in Word and Spirit to enter into relationships of with others in imitation of the divine trinity in which we have been made.



OUR TRINITARIAN JOURNEY

Pope Francis reminds us that "The mystery of the Trinity was revealed to us by Jesus himself. He showed us the face of God as merciful Father. He presented himself as the Son of God and Word of the Father, the Savior who gives his life for us. And he spoke of the Holy Spirit who proceeds from the Father and the Son as our Consoler and Advocate.

"The Trinity is the ultimate goal toward which our earthly pilgrimage is directed. The journey of the Christian life is essentially a *Trinitarian* journey: the Holy Spirit reminds us what Jesus taught us and guides us to full knowledge of Christ's teachings. Jesus, in turn, came into the world to make the Father known to us, to guide us to Him, to reconcile us with Him.

Everything in the Christian life revolves around the mystery of the Trinity and is fulfilled according to this infinite mystery. Therefore, we seek to always live in such a way that we remember what goal, what glory we exist for, work for, struggle for, suffer for, and what immense reward we are called to. This mystery embraces our entire life and our entire Christian being. We remember it, for example, each time we make the sign of the cross: in the name of the Father, of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."

A TRINITY OF LOVE

"Three Persons are *one God* because the Father is love, the Son is love, the Spirit is love. God does not live in splendid solitude but rather is an inexhaustible source of life that is ceaselessly given and communicated. The image of the Most Holy Trinity is in a certain way impressed upon everything that exists, because everything that exists, down to the least particle, is a being in relationships, and thus creative Love shines forth. All comes from love, tends toward love, and is moved by love, naturally, according to different grades of consciousness and freedom. The strongest proof that we are made in the image of the Trinity is this: only love makes us happy, because we live in relationships, and we live to love and be loved."
