PASTOR'S CORNER

Aloha my Brothers and Sisters,

The Catholic sacrament of Baptism is the foundational sacrament that washes away original sin, brings the person into the Body of Christ, and initiates them into the Church, making them a member of God's family. Administered through the ritualistic pouring of water or immersion in water while reciting the Trinitarian formula ("I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit"), it confers sanctifying grace and the presence of the Holy Spirit, opening the door to receive all other sacraments and the new life in Jesus Christ.

Why does Baptism have to come first?

Every other sacrament depends on us being in a relationship of friendship with God. But friendship demands some sort of equality between people. Obviously, there is no way in which we can put ourselves on level ground with God. But God has chosen to put Himself on level ground with us by taking on human nature in the Person of His Son, Jesus Christ. In Baptism, we are united with Jesus by God's grace—sharing in the salvation He won by His death and Resurrection. Being one with Jesus establishes us in a relationship with God the Father which allows us to call upon Him as our own Father. Without this initial grace of God, we would not be prepared to receive His other graces.

What are the symbols of Baptism and what do they mean?

Water: This is the primary symbol of Baptism, and it is necessary for a valid baptism. Water represents life, cleansing, new birth—all of which are given to us spiritually in Baptism. But water also represents a forceful power which brings death. In the Red Sea, God gave the Israelites new life by leading them through water, but the same water rushed upon the Egyptians who pursued them. Spiritually, this represents the fact that the waters of Baptism give us a new life in God by first destroying in us the power of sin to which we were previously enslaved.

White Garment: The color white symbolizes purity. This represents the fact that Baptism washes away the stain of all sin in a person, making of them a new creation. Being clothed in it calls to mind that we are clothed with Christ in Baptism.

Baptismal Candle: This candle represents, the light of Christ: calling to mind the risen Christ Himself, who is the light of the world, but also calling to mind the faith which He offers us. It is lit from the Paschal Candle to represent the fact that this light is a gift which we receive from Christ as a gift, and which needs to be carefully guarded against anything that threatens to extinguish it.

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Oil of Catechumens: This oil represents the strength that God gives us to enter the spiritual combat of life. Athletes and gladiators would anoint themselves with oil before the contest: this rite draws on that imagery.

Sacred Chrism: Before Christ, priests, prophets, and kings were consecrated with this kind of perfumed oil. In the New Testament, Jesus perfectly fulfills all these roles in His Person. Our anointing with chrism calls to mind that, being united to Christ in Baptism, we are consecrated in these roles.

What does it mean to be “consecrated”?

To be consecrated means to be “set apart” for a purpose: for the worship of God. It is marked by an anointing with Sacred Chrism. In the Old Testament, priests were “set apart” to offer sacrifices to God, prophets to receive God’s word and bring it to others, and kings to order all things in their kingdom in harmony for the common good.

Next week, we will look specifically at the Sacrament of Eucharist.

SUNDAY GOSPEL REFLECTION BY CATHOLIC STEWARDSHIP CONSULTANTS

After today’s readings, we can’t say we have not been warned about the dangers of mixed-up priorities. God’s Word is so very clear today on the necessity of putting Him first in all areas of our lives.

We see this in the First Reading from Amos. The Lord has harsh words for those who would take advantage of the poor and whose priorities are not aligned with God’s.

In the Second Reading from St. Paul’s letter to Timothy, Paul gives us the antidote to the self-centeredness condemned in our First Reading. The antidote is to imitate Christ, “who gave Himself as a ransom for all.” Rather than thinking of Himself and how to “get ahead,” Christ gave Himself away — completely — for our sake. That is how we are to live.

In our Gospel passage from Luke, the Lord shows us how to bridge the gap between worldly thinking and priorities and eternal thinking and priorities. Jesus tells the parable of the corrupt but clever steward who is about to be fired when the master discovers the steward has been squandering his property. Realizing his imminent unemployed status, the clever steward reaches out to the various debtors of his master to wheel and deal with them, making friends who would look out for him when he became jobless.

What if we put that kind of effort into our own tasks as good stewards of all God’s gifts to us? Into our ministries, into the ways we could make more time for prayer as individuals, as couples, as families, and as a parish. What if we got as creative as the “bad steward” in the use of our finance so that we could give more generously to the poor and the advancement of God’s kingdom on the earth? That’s our lesson and our challenge.

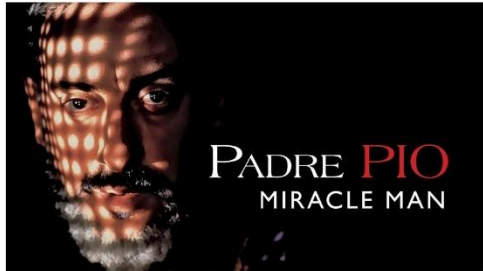

- Pope Francis further entrusted Our Lady of Guadalupe to those awaiting the birth of their children, reinforcing her patronage for the unborn.

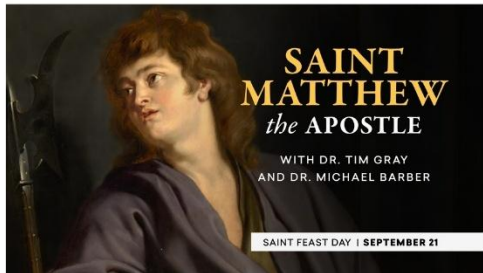

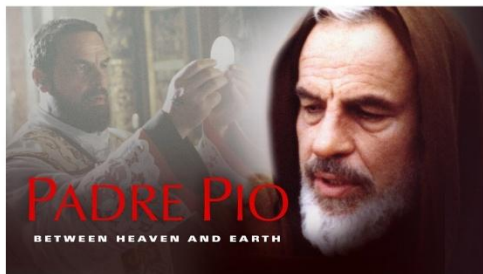
Padre Pio: Miracle Man

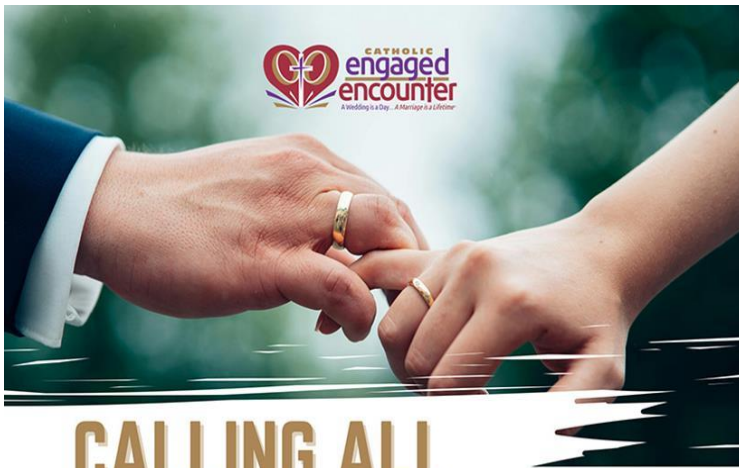

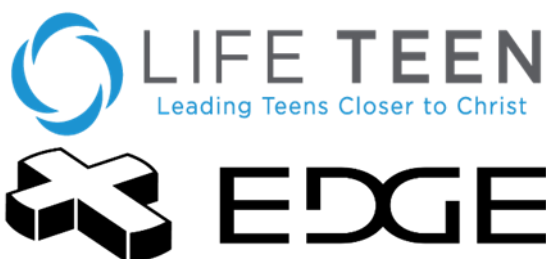

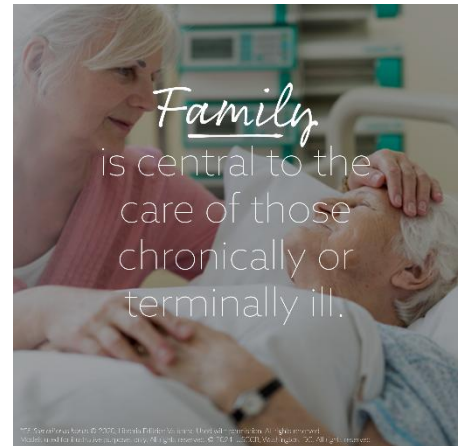
