SUNDAY GOSPEL REFLECTION

Are We “Good Stewards?”

“May your grace, O Lord, we pray, at all times go before us and follow after and make us always determined to carry out good works.” These words from today’s opening prayer defines truly what a “good steward” is. Good stewards are covered and protected by God’s grace so that they can perform good deeds with their time, talent and treasure. We are called to be the good stewards of the Lord! As the rich young man of our Gospel, Jesus asks us to put aside what is keeping us from God in order to fully engage with those in need. Jesus’ question is not whether money is good or bad. The challenge is what we do with our time, talent and treasure for the benefit of all. The rich young man from the gospel can’t embrace Jesus’ call to let go of what is so central to his person. What about us? Can we let go? Can we embrace the call of Jesus to share our talents with our community? Do we have the desire to take few hours a week to share our time with those members of our community in need? Could we see ourselves giving up some of our wants so we can give more of our treasure to the Church or charity? Understanding the idea of stewardship is relatively simple, it can be hard in practice. In terms of time it is good to consider taking on a “spiritual exercise” such as praying a rosary when you normally would have watched a television show.

Share your talents with our community. Get involve in one of our many ministries. Make sure your entire family is involved in it. Sometimes we let money rule not only our budget but our hearts and spirits as well. “Spiritualize” the practice of giving to the Church by praying over your donation envelope, either by yourself or with your family. Teach your children the importance of sharing their wealth with others in need. Make sure that contributions are understood by the whole family. Ask your children to place your family envelope in the basket. I hope some of these ideas will resonate with you. Let’s always keep in mind that stewardship is a spirituality - a way of living our life in the knowledge that everything is a gift from God, and that we have a responsibility to use our gifts for God’s purposes.

PASTOR'S CORNER

Why Lay Witness This Sunday

One of the important ways we prepare for stewardship renewal weekend is lay witness. A lay witness is a parishioner chosen each year by the pastor to give his or her testimony on their stewardship journey. They are parishioners who already believe and practice stewardship as a way of life, by giving to the parish of what God has given them in time, talent and treasure.

Lay witnesses send a strong message to their fellow parishioners about giving of oneself and one's possessions and time in gratitude for all the gifts God has given them and their families. People who hear that stewardship is working for other people are motivated to bring stewardship into their own lives.

This year, I asked Nestor Tantamco (Jun) married to his wife, Medina. They have three beautiful children: Jessica, Kyros and Lea. I got to know Jun better when he volunteered to be a daily altar server at the daily morning Mass. He told me that he was a small businessman, a family business. At first I was surprised by his self-giving of his morning time before going to his business. He told me that this is how he begins his day, by giving to God what God has given him and his family. Before long Jun asked to be a Sunday and daily Mass Extraordinary Minister of the Holy Eucharist (EMHE). Sunday after Sunday I saw this family together at Mass, and after Mass they would take time to talk to their family friends in the church before going home. While others rush to their cars, the Tantamco's would still be there after the 9 am Mass joyfully talking story! These are all qualities of an ordinary family with an extraordinary sense of stewardship as a way of life. Jessica, Kyros and Lea, you are so lucky to have such wonderful parents who with you live stewardship as a way of life.

May God bless you. May God bless all families here at St. John's for their stewardship hearts of giving their time, talents and treasure so that God's work in the parish may continue.

READINGS FOR NEXT SUNDAY, OCTOBER 21, 2018**Twenty- Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time****First Reading: Isaiah 53:10-11**

This short passage provides several themes: a portrait of the suffering servant of God; an example of what comes out of suffering; and suggests a way to come out of the vicious circle of violence. The passage clearly states that the servant is crushed to the point of losing his life, and it seems that God is instrumental in his suffering. The servant is also portrayed as giving himself as scapegoat, by whose suffering shall justify many.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 33:4-5,18-19,20,22

Psalm 33 opens with a statement that reflects the basis of ancient Israel's faith in God (vv. 4-5). This faith is rooted in the truth of God's word, faithfulness of God's work, the justice of God's covenant and the steadfastness of God's love. That is the foundation of the trust expressed in the response: "Lord, let your mercy be on us, as we place our trust in you."

Second Reading: Hebrews 4:14-16

This reading contains a double exhortation: to hold fast to faith and to approach the throne of grace with confidence because Jesus intercedes for all who turn to him. Jesus is described as the high priest who was tempted was tempted in every way and therefore who can sympathize with human struggle and thus reconciliation has been achieved through the blood of Christ.

Gospel: Mark 10:35-45

This passage contains misunderstanding, paradoxes and reversals. James and John seek places of honor in the kingdom, but Jesus tells them that real prominence is found in service, not in wielding authority over others. The others are indignant because James and John beat them to making that request first. When Jesus speaks of drinking the cup and James and John accepting, that is an example of misunderstanding. Drinking the cup is not about a banquet! What Jesus is speaking about is his suffering and death. This is a complete reversal of what the disciples were thinking. To be a leader in the vision and teaching of Jesus is to be a servant and slave of all.

To All Parishioners in the Diocese of Honolulu

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Peace be with you!

October is designated as Pro-Life month in the United States Catholic Church, and we are asked to focus on the extremely important issues related to defending the lives of the unborn, of the sick and elderly, and of all who are vulnerable. And the first Tuesday of November is Election Day in our country (though many in Hawaii will vote much sooner by mail). There is an important link between these two realities.

Although there is much popular talk about the “separation of Church and State,” it is still extremely important that we people of faith have a voice regarding the laws of our land. Our faith teaches us many principles based on the teachings of Jesus, and following these principles is not only good for Catholics but for the entire society. What is a law, after all, but a community’s concrete expression of the values it expects its citizens to live? All laws have a moral basis. Therefore, our insistence on a respect for life in all its stages from conception until natural death, our championing the dignity of every human person, and our care for the poor and suffering are hallmarks not only of our faith, but of the law that is “written in our hearts.”

I urge all of you, therefore, to prayerfully and thoughtfully consider the issues on which we are called to vote and the people who will be articulating those issues into law. A blind loyalty to a particular political party with which one has always been affiliated is not always what is called for in this time when our institutions and laws are very much in need of a moral compass that is based on the God who gave us our rights and laws that flow from our nature. And, of course, I urge all of you to VOTE and to exercise this responsibility so many people in the world can only dream about. May you be guided by the Holy Spirit, and may your vote be for the good of our entire community!
