SUNDAY GOSPEL REFLECTION

What kind of givers are we?

The readings this weekend tell of two stories of generosity. Both concerns two very poor people: two widows. The widow of Zarephath from the first reading teaches us how to be an instrument of God's providence. She offers hospitality by giving what she has trusting that what we need will be provided. Then we wonder how someone who was as poor as the widow in the Gospel was able to perform such an act of spontaneous goodness. One needs to have been faithful over many years to the practice of generosity to have had a heart like hers.

It is not achieved by a few great deeds but by a lot of little ones. Jesus praises the poor widow, who drops only two small coins in the coffer of the temple, unlike the others who put in their surplus money. In exalting the poor widow's gift, Jesus makes us realize that numbers are not the true value of giving in the "economy" of God. It is what we give from our want, not from our extra, that reveals what we truly value and what we want our lives and world to be. It is not the measure of the gift but the measure of the love that directs the gift that is great before God. It is not the knowledge we have attained nor the wealth we command but our willingness to put those things at the service of others that gives meaning to our faith. It is not the size of what we give or the impact of what we do but the love and sacrifice in which we give that makes our gift to another holy in God's eyes.

What set the widow's offerings apart was not just its proportion to their means; there was something in their characters that lifted the gift out of routine into the realm of sacrifice. No gift of love is too small, and nothing escapes the notice of God from whom no secrets are hidden.

What kind of givers are we? Do we give ourselves or from our excess? Jesus' challenge is to give everything we have, without holding anything back. Let us strive to be like the widows who demonstrated trust and generosity. Let us be mindful that Christ himself served as the perfect example of generosity by offering his life so that our own thirst and hunger could be quenched. Let us likewise be instruments of Christ's unselfish giving.

READINGS FOR NEXT SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 18, 2018

Thirty—Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

First Reading: Daniel 12:1-3

The apocalyptic vision of Daniel in this passage is about the final end of times. The passage alludes to resurrection followed by reward or punishment. The people will rise either to a life of horror or to eternal life. The phrase “at that time” refers to the future character of the event. Each nation seems to have an advocate in the heavenly court who comes to their defense. Michael the Archangel, whose name means “who is like God” shall arise because he is the defender of Israel especially in battle. Here he rises up to defend those under his charge, those faithful till the end, the ones who “shall live forever.”

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 16:5,8,9-10,11

The verses in Psalm 16 speak about covenant relationship with God and the confidence that comes from that relationship. The psalm uses two images to express that relationship: the land given to Israel as part of their identity to provide for their sustenance. The second image is the cup. At a sacrificial meal, the people drank from one cup to signify their unity with each other and their God. This God is so present to the people that He walks with them. “With him at my right hand I shall not be disturbed.”

Second Reading: Hebrews 10:11-14,18

The passage from Hebrews underscores the uniqueness of Christ’s sacrifice. The purpose of both the Jewish sacrifice and that Christ is the expiation of sin. The passage draws a contrast between the Jewish sacrifice offered daily, and the sacrifice of Christ who “offered one sacrifice for sins... For by one offering he has made perfect forever those who are being consecrated.” In other words, the efficacy of Christ’s sacrifice transcends both space and time unlike the Jewish sacrifice. For that reason his once and for all sacrifice is unrepeatable.

Gospel: Mark 13:24-32

The appearance of the end times is described by in terms of apocalyptic traditions. Among these is the reference to the tribulations that precede the coming of the new age and the coming of the Son of Man in the clouds. In the words of Jesus, cosmic signs will accompany these end times indicating that all creation has been thrown into chaos, a sign that God is once again in charge. Just as God exercised supreme authority over chaos at creation so too the new creation is the exclusive work of God. At the end of the Gospel passage Jesus indicates that the exact time for these end times is not known. Therefore be prepared.

Be generous and you will be prosperous; help others and you will be helped.” (Good News Translation) - Prov 11:25

OCC Construction Update

We are seriously building! On Wednesday, November 7, a preconstruction meeting took place between the Architects, General Contractor (GC), the Project Manager (PM) and parish representatives. The purpose of the meeting was to get an update from both the GC and the PM on where we are at the moment. The meeting also aimed at putting in place areas of coordination between the Architects, GC, PM and St. John's before the construction begins.

According to the GC (Design Build of Hawaii) there was still more paperwork to be done before getting the construction permits. With regard to the construction, the tentative date of beginning the construction of the One Community Center is now set for November 26, right after Thanksgiving Day. If you look on our lawn, you will see red paint marking the line of the construction fence that will soon be put in place before construction begins.

In preparation for construction, the GC will cordon off the total space needed with a "silt fence on three sides and plywood fence on the church side. Part of the parking lot towards Kipapa Drive will also be cordoned off for the GC use. The entrance on Kipapa will be gated and used only by the GC trucks. This means that our parking lot will be reduced by about half during week days, but we will have access to the other half on Sundays. We will be using Kuahelani Avenue entrance only and exit through the same gate. The good news is that the GC is prepared to accommodate us especially when we have funerals. All we have to do is inform them. As construction begins, we will all be able to monitor the progress via a site camera with a link on our parish website.

We will give more details before November 26. We will all have to be patient as well as considerate especially to those differently abled, the elderly and families with small children.

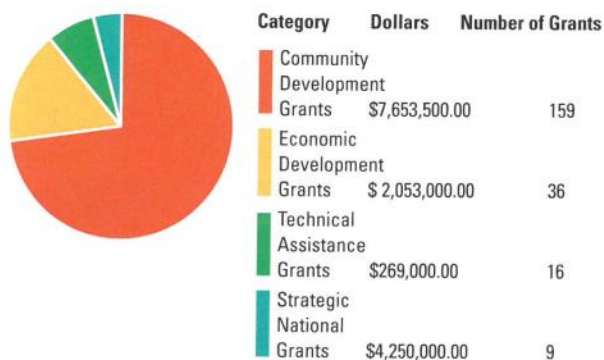

Nuestra fe nos llama a caminar con nuestros hermanos y hermanas quienes se encuentran al margen de la sociedad y a capacitarlos para crear un cambio en sus comunidades. Con el apoyo que ustedes le den a la Campaña Católica para el Desarrollo Humano (CCHD), este tipo de cambio duradero se hace posible. El costo para alquilar un apartamento o para comprar una propiedad en Portland, Oregon, ha aumentado más allá de lo que es posible para familias de ingresos bajos y moderados. Esto ha creado una crisis de vivienda que ha dejado a mucha gente imposibilitada de encontrar un lugar asequible para vivir. Pero, con el apoyo de ustedes, a las familias trabajadoras les es posible vivir en su comunidad y

sus hogares pueden seguir siendo asequibles para las generaciones venideras. Con el apoyo que le brindan a los compradores de vivienda los grupos financiados por CCHD, más de 330 personas de ingresos bajos y moderados hoy cuentan con un hogar y con estabilidad financiera, lo cual les ha traído un cambio duradero a su vida. Además, su apoyo brinda capacitación para que las personas obtengan las herramientas necesarias para organizar a su comunidad y oportunidades para que los líderes puedan presentar esos asuntos en la arena pública. Con su ayuda, los residentes han abogado por la protección de los inquilinos e incrementado la disponibilidad de viviendas en su comunidad.

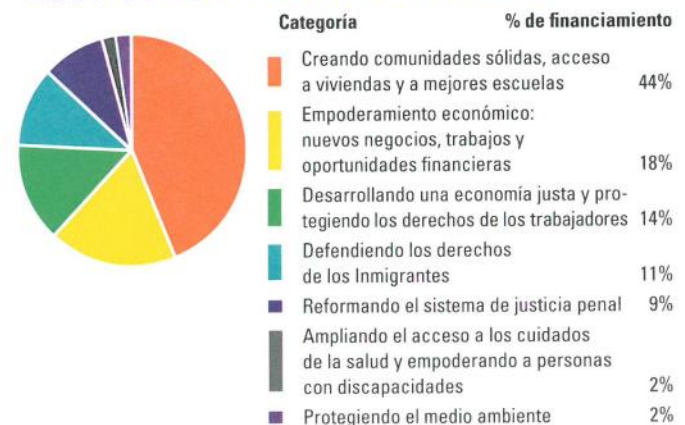
